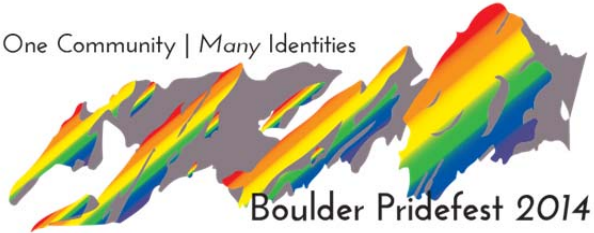

**Out Boulder Announces the Boulder Premier of “Limited Partnership”**

**BOULDER, Colo.** –Out Boulder is proud to announce that it will host the Boulder premier of “Limited Partnership” on Monday, September 8<sup>th</sup> at the Nomad Theater. Marriage Equality for same-gender loving couples is still not legal in Colorado and we have been waging this battle for equality since 1975 when the then Boulder County Clerk and Recorder Clela Rorex issued the first in the nation marriage licenses to same-sex couples.

The movie Limited Partnership tells the 40-year love story between Filipino-American Richard Adams and Australian Tony Sullivan, who, in 1975 in Boulder CO, became one of the first same-sex couples to be legally married. After applying for a green card for Tony based on their marriage, the couple received a denial letter from the Immigration and Naturalization Service stating, “You have failed to establish that a bona fide marital relationship can exist between two faggots.” Outraged at the tone, tenor and politics of this letter and to prevent Tony’s impending deportation, the couple sued the U.S. government, filing the first federal lawsuit seeking equal treatment for a same-sex marriage in U.S. history.
